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Washing up is one of those chores people tend to either love or hate. But whichever camp you fall into, there are plenty of compelling reasons to add one of the very best dishwashers to your kitchen. While an investment at first, the appliance can be a real time-saver and provides a more thorough clean, thanks to their higher operating temperatures and stronger detergents killing more bacteria than a sink wash. Not to mention they can even save you money in the long run; research suggests they use less water and energy when tackling a whole meal's worth of dirty dishes. We've tested a range of dishwashers at the Good Housekeeping Institute to find the best buys. Here they are at a glance: Full size vs slimline vs integrated dishwashers When shopping for a dishwasher, there are two questions you need to ask yourself: how often are you going to use it, and how much space do you have? This will inform whether you pick a full-size or a slimline dishwasher. As a guide, slimline models should fit into a 45cm-wide gap, while full-size dishwashers are about 60cm wide. In terms of how much washing up these can conquer, a slimline model will fit between eight and nine place settings and a full-sized one should accommodate at least 12 – that's around 120-150 items of crockery and cutlery. If you want a dishwasher that fits the design of your kitchen, go for an integrated model. This will be installed within a kitchen unit and have a door that matches your cupboards. Generally, the control panel is hidden on the top lip of the door. Energy efficiency All dishwashers are rated for energy efficiency. The scale runs from A to G, with A being the most economical. Even models with lower ratings will still be fairly efficient though, as the scale was updated in 2021 to allow for new technological innovations. Note that which cycle you use at home will impact your machine's energy consumption too: while an eco wash runs for a long time, it uses much less water than a standard or intensive wash, and therefore requires less energy to heat up. Scrape your plates before you stack them to get the most out of your dishwasher, but don't rinse them as this also uses a lot of water. Soaking stubborn stains before washing can also help. Dishwasher settings explained With minimal settings, dishwashers are generally simple to use. Normal, eco and intensive cycles come as standard, but it's worth knowing the specific purpose of each to optimise your dishwasher's cleaning potential: Normal: Best for daily use, this cycle removes standard dirt and food stains using water that's around 60 to 65C. Eco: Best for lightly soiled plates and cutlery, economy cycles take longer to complete but uses less water than other ones. The water is still hot too, at between 50 and 55C. Intensive: Best for tackling stubborn baked-on food (and cleaning your dishwasher!) this runs at temperatures of up to 70 degrees. Delicate: Best for glassware and delicate china, the water temperature will be lower than normal. Quick wash: Best for when your dishes aren't too dirty and you need them cleaned speedily. Hygiene: Best for items that need sterilising, such as baby products or chopping boards. This programme will wash at a high temperature. Sensor wash: Found on dishwashers with built-in sensors, the programme time, temperature and amount of water will adjust according to how dirty the dishes are. Design features to look for Now you know what cycles you'd like access to, it's time to decide which additional features you want. Here are the ones we'd consider: Adjustable racks: Giving you extra flexibility, these racks can be moved up or down to accommodate larger plates on the bottom rack, or tall glasses on the top. Automatic open-door drying: The door automatically opens at the end of a cycle to allow fresh air in and moist air out. Fold-down tines: Tines are the prongs that keep your dishes upright and spaced out. Look for ones that fold down flat if you often need room for larger items. Salt and rinse aid indicators: These alerts tell you when it's time to top up dishwasher salt and rinse aid – both essential for successful cleans. Smart features: Some dishwashers connect to WiFi, so you can control them via an app and start, stop or put a delay timer on remotely. With some, you can also download extra programmes, adjust the intensity of a wash and run diagnostic tests. How we test dishwashers We rate each dishwasher on its performance across a standard, economy and intensive cycle. To do this we stain a range of glassware, crockery, cutlery, pots and pans using common and notoriously difficult to remove stains – think lipstick on a glass and burnt pasta sauce on a pyrex dish – to judge how well each appliance cleans. Each stain is weighed and applied precisely, and we use the same detergent for every cycle to ensure consistent results. For normal and economy cycles, we check that the maximum number of place settings claimed fit in the dishwasher, while on an intensive programme we use fewer. We record the water and energy consumption for every cycle, before finally considering the buttons, settings, design and instructions in our overall assessment. We also reviewed each machine's ease of use, water and energy usage, and how loud or quiet the dishwasher was while operating. Synonymous with quality and experience, it now produces a wide range of consumer goods from its factories across the globe, several of which are in the US. Bosch's dishwasher production has come a long way since the company launched its first machine in 1964. Nowadays, there is a huge choice across five sub-ranges, from budget options right up to premium models. As such, it features standard built-in dimensions (23.5 x 34 x 23.75 inches) – note that Bosch also offers narrower, 18-inch wide dishwashers should you not have the space for one of the normal-sized models. Bosch also manufactures both front and top-controlled machines, but this particular model fits into the former category. Ordinarily, we're not so keen on the front-controlled design, as it can mean having to kneel down in front of the machine in order to see what you're doing. However, the 300 Series SHEM63W55N bucks the trend somewhat, its front-facing control panel angled upwards slightly inside the pocket-handle recess, meaning you don't have to stoop so low to program your cycles. We also like the fact that this dishwasher has push buttons, as we sometimes find that touch controls can be a little insensitive and require a bit of force to activate them. One thing this model does lack, however, is a fingerprint-resistant fascia, so you might want to keep your little ones at arm's length. Inside the machine is a large stainless-steel tub that houses three racks. These more or less conform to the traditional set-up found in most dishwashers – so, there's a rack at the bottom for larger items such as plates and pans; a middle rack for smaller things like glasses, mugs and bowls (this can be height-adjusted to three different settings, depending on your requirements); and a cutlery rack at the top for laying out your knives, forks, utensils, etc. It's worth mentioning here that this V-shaped third rack is slightly deeper than some we've seen, meaning you can also use it to stash things like ramekins and tea cups. If you run out of room for your cutlery, the machine also comes with a large cutlery basket that can be inserted into the bottom rack. Finally, a quick word about how this dishwasher looks. While it's not really for us to tell you whether it's attractive or not – ultimately, that comes down to personal taste – we think the German manufacturer has got the aesthetic just right. With its sleek, modern lines and uniquely designed control panel, the 300 Series SHEM63W55N left us feeling that we'd be happy to have it in our kitchen. (Image credit: Home Depot) Bosch 300 Series SHEM63W55N dishwasher review: Features As we often say when reviewing dishwashers, a pleasing design is nothing without a good set of features – the most important of which is, of course, an ability to thoroughly clean and dry your plates, pots, cups, etc. Bosch has certainly not cut any corners in this department, with the 300 Series SHEM63W55N containing a number of the core features that you'd find in more expensive competitors. With some dishwashers, the only way you can guarantee that your dishes will come out sparkling clean is to give them a good rinse before putting them in the machine. Bosch's PrecisionWash technology aims to save you this hassle. Once you've started one of the five cycles (1 Hour, Auto, Normal, Pots & Pans, or Rinse), intelligent sensors will continually monitor the progress of your wash to detect any areas that still need work. Powerful precision spray arms will then target those areas, to make sure that your entire load comes out looking clean. For extra peace of mind, you could activate the Sanitize option, which raises the temperature of the water to eliminate 99.9% of bacteria. Got guests coming and want your dishes to gleam as you set the table? The machine's ExtraShine option will raise the wash temperature and extend the drying time to ensure that your plates and cups come out looking as good as new. There might also be times when you only need to wash a few lightly soiled items. In that case, you can activate the Half Load option, which reduces the cycle time and therefore the water usage, meaning you won't end up spending more money than you need to. Whichever cycle you choose, the machine's bright LED display will show you how long there is left, meaning you won't have to rely on guesswork. You might want to time your dishwasher cycles so that they don't clash with people taking showers and use up all the hot water. Achieving this is simple, thanks to the 24-hour Delay Start Timer. As well as that, this machine also comes with a number of safety features, including a self-latching door that prevents children from injuring themselves, and an AquaStop leak detection system that'll shut down the machine if something is amiss. (Image credit: Home Depot) Bosch 300 Series SHEM63W55N dishwasher review: Performance When it comes to judging a dishwasher's performance, it's not just how well it cleans and dries the dishes that you need to consider. Energy and water efficiency are important, too, as they can make a real difference to how much your bills are at the end of each month. In terms of energy expenditure, the Bosch 300 Series SHEM63W55N uses 269kWh/yr. That's not good enough to place it in this list of the most efficient dishwashers (opens in new tab) but it's still decent enough to earn the appliance an Energy Star rating. As for water consumption, it's estimated that the machine will use a total of 624 gallons per year. Though other dishwashers rate more highly in these areas, Bosch reckons that this machine's third rack increases its load capacity by 30%. In theory, that should mean you'll need fewer washes, which will save you some money in the long run. One area in which this machine does excel is noise rating. In a recent study, Bosch was found to be the quietest dishwasher brand in the US, and, while this particular model isn't the most muted in existence (it's no GE Profile Smart GDT530PSPSS (opens in new tab), for example), with a rating of 44dBA it certainly isn't going to be keeping anyone awake at night. Bosch 300 Series SHEM63W55N dishwasher review: User reviews The user rating for this dishwasher is displayed right at the top of its page on the Bosch website – and there's a good reason for that. Based on more than 5,000 reviews, the 300 Series SHEM63W55N has earned an overall rating of 4.6 out of 5 stars. Bosch has also enabled its customers to rate this machine in a number of specific categories, and here, again, the dishwasher has performed brilliantly, scoring 4.7 for the range of programs, 4.5 for loading comfort, 4.5 for cleaning and drying results, and 4.9 for operating noise. One five-star reviewer described the appliance as "unbelievably awesome", adding that "the removal of deeply embedded stains in some of the grooves in the design of my plates, etc. I would have never thought possible, but seriously miracles do happen. I couldn't be more pleased, or should I say elated, at the results." Another user had a mixed experience with the machine. Acknowledging that it was "extraordinarily quiet", the three-star writer added: "I am not a fan of how the items smell after a wash. They just don't smell clean, even after a sanitizing wash." While one-star reviews are very much in the minority, they do exist and one dissatisfied customer was particularly unhappy with the machine's drying capabilities: "Not at all what I expected for a top named product," they complained. "You must use the Extra Dry cycle if you want the dishes to be dry, and even then you still have to dry the glasses." For balance, we should add that the Bosch 300 Series SHEM63W55N dishwasher scores 4.3 out of 5 stars on Amazon, based on 57 global ratings. Should you buy the Bosch 300 Series SHEM63W55N dishwasher? If you need a dishwasher with a larger capacity, then the 300 Series SHEM63W55N should definitely be in the running. While it's not particularly cheap for a mid-range machine, you get what you pay for and Bosch's reputation for quality is reflected in just about everything this appliance does: it's robust, it looks good, it cleans well, it's quiet and it's safe. Sure, it only offers a small selection of cycles and options, but even that has its benefits, as it means you're less likely to be bamboozled by permutations.
